

# From the President

2009 will go down as a very eventful year in school libraries.

As I settle into my role as president I am heartened by the strength and depth of capable members we have in our organisation. My intention is to harness these strengths and facilitate the collaboration of groups of like-minded people working together to achieve positive outcomes for colleagues in school libraries. We already have a number of these initiatives: The standards for school libraries working party, the team who created the SLANZA Wiki and that team have now turned their energies to the website design.

Christchurch, who once again turned on a superb conference, was a real highlight of 2009 and those of us fortunate enough to attend gained so much in professional development and collegial support.

We all nervously awaited the outcome of National Library's internal review and will now be monitoring with great interest the new initiatives set to be rolled out in the new school year. 0800 LIBLINE has already been established and seems to have been well received.

Our SLANZA Wiki is being well used by members and hopefully if you haven't yet had a chance to have a really good look around, you'll be able to take advantage of a bit more time during the holidays to check out the great resources and information there.

SLANZA National Executive has been grappling with the issues surrounding our website for over a year now and certainly listened to our membership feedback at this year's AGM so it is with great excitement that I can announce that the team who put together our Wiki has been working like Trojans over the past couple of months on the development of our new SLANZA website. Tweaking and adding will continue over the summer but we are hopeful that it will be ready for launching at the beginning of the 2010 school year. I've been fortunate enough to have a sneak peek at the work already done and it's looking fantastic.

School librarians continue to struggle with the issues surrounding pay and conditions and it is most disheartening that due to economic conditions and a change of government that NZEI has so far been unable to negotiate any pay increase in the latest bargaining round. Be assured that SLANZA National Executive is working hard on our member's behalf and are currently in discussion with LIANZA and National Library about ways forward for school libraries in 2010.

On the National front, we have growing representation on a number of national bodies including: The New Zealand Libraries Strategic Advisory Forum; the EPIC Governance Group; the AnyQuestions Service Overview Group; the LIANZA Professional Registration Scheme; the 2009 LIANZA Remuneration Survey Committee; the Marketing the Profession Working Group; the Te Puna Strategic Advisory Committee; the Multiple Literacies Working Group; the Open Polytechnic Information and Library Studies Committee and the PPTA ICT Taskforce.

The Strategic Advisory Forum is well apprised of the plight of our school sector and is very sympathetic to our cause. To this end we are awaiting the release of a report commissioned by this group looking at areas of concern. Be assured that we do have support within the wider library community and your National Executive will continue to advocate at every opportunity.

A truly bright spot to end 2009 with is the partnership formed with Book Protection Products who we have just signed a three year sponsorship agreement with. This will see Book Protection Products providing financial support until 2012 for regional professional development. We are most grateful to Warwick for his support of SLANZA initiatives and we are excited about working with him over the next few years. ### **The impact of library development in the Cook Islands: 'Share the moment'**

This session was a positive reminder that it doesn't take much to make a difference to improve the access to good literature and the web through effective planning, consultation and face to face support by library advisors. Schools in the Cook Islands have struggled to establish good libraries, partly because of funds, a lack of support and the continual "good works" of philanthropists who think old books from New Zealand are good enough for the students of the Cook Islands. No more!

The presenters, Kathy George and Liz Kapi from the Cook Islands MOE and Alice Heather from the National lib of NZ, showed how libraries were transformed into vibrant, modern, student-centred environments using their combined expertise and with a lot of aroha and commitment from local communities.

What are the lessons for New Zealand schools?

Firstly, don't even think about sending your unwanted books to schools in the Pacific Islands.

Secondly, for many small schools, where finance may be an issue, think about how you can use the creative resources of your community to develop a library that reflects the cultures of that community.

And thirdly, keep calling on the face-to-face contact of your school library advisors. They provide the necessary expertise.

### **Michele Whiting**

Suzette Boyd's dynamic presentation **Turning Heads in the Connected Library** certainly made me sit up, listen and be inspired. In this time of rapid change she asked if we "Are plugged in and switched on" and stressed the need to have a long term vision. She shared with us many of her activities eg. Literature lunch, Books, Blokes and Breckie, suggestions book etc.

### **101 ways to get your library buzzing**

This was presented by the very motivated Ashburton College Library staff of 3 at a co-ed college with a role of 1200 students. The library team work together in a very user focused, service centred team feeding off each others skills and expertise. They had many ideas including doing a SWOT with the staff and students, making up user friendly guides for all services that the students access, asking about student and staff needs.

**Derek Wenmoth: I speak for the trees** spoke of the trends and challenges we face with the impact of e-learning in education. We were made aware of trends to watch out for and forward planning to cater for differences in learning and teaching styles by providing access to relevant resources and technologies.

### **Avondale College book club and blog**

This was presented by another dynamic team of 3 who work very closely together. They gave many reasons for having a Book Club - student participation, book awareness, increase issues, something different for students to do and encouraging them to try something new etc. We were walked through all the stages of the growth of the group, great marketing ideas and development of the blog.

On Tuesday we started with a very informative address by **Nathan Mikare- Wallis - The Learning Brain: Understanding Neuroscience**. It gave me an understanding of some of the behaviour patterns that I experience with our students and strategies for dealing with them.

### **Jane Rodgers - The reference interview: strategies to ensure success.**

This session reinforced the importance of spending time to find out what the question is and how to encourage information transformation.

### **Suzette Boyd - Do we need a school library home page?**

This session tackled a question many of us are dealing with or have dealt with. There were lots of practical ideas for planning ideas for content, design and promotion. A very useful tip I thought was to budget every year for "web page development" because it is an ongoing process which needs reviewing and updating.

**Breakfast with Des Hunt.** I now think of him as the Mad Scientist who writes books. Des set up an experiment using swing balls on a frame plus extra bits and pieces added to it. He used this to explain what a good book needs to keep moving all the way through and have a good bang at the end. He explained that he likes to write children's novels that are set in New Zealand and he includes a place, an animal and something he would like his readers to learn.

**Suzette Boyd: Marketing and promoting the library - Do NOT succumb to the temptation to wait for others to notice what a great job you're doing!** Suzette had endless ideas for marketing and promoting the library. She advised not to worry about overdue library books, not to send out mass negative messages to the whole school or staff but to promote and tell everyone of the good positive changes and happenings in our libraries.

## SLANZA Wiki

SLANZA members have really taken to the wiki. It is being very well supported and the statistics have blown us away, between August and November there were 45,199 page views! People looked at about 7 pages per visit on average and spent 7.28 minutes on the site. There are currently 367 members, 199 pages, 235 discussion threads and 64 photos on the wiki.

The wiki questionnaire was an interesting exercise, and we are really grateful for your participation. We asked if you wanted the wiki to be open to view or if you preferred to have it for members only. Support for both private and public was very evenly split, too close to call. We felt uncomfortable acting on the questionnaire when the response was limited and the split in opinion was so close, so we consulted with the writers, moderators, and the SLANZA National Exec. They had to respond to us by Friday 4<sup>th</sup> December and this they have done. Therefore, taking into account their responses and the fact that they have clearly stated their cases we have decided to go with the majority of their responses, which mean that the wiki will be open. Only SLANZA members will be able to post on the wiki, and it will be a condition of membership that your profile is on there so that we can tell who are members, and who are not. We are going to make a sample profile which you can use as a guide if you would like to, hopefully this will allay some of the worries about the profiles. The wiki being open solves many of the technical problems we have. We completely understand why some people will be unhappy about the wiki being open to view, and within the team of moderators there is difference of opinion but we have tried to be fair and do what the majority wanted.

In support of making the wiki private, people considered

*the wiki as an added benefit of membership*  
*privacy issues - being able to share concern, and the privacy of their personal information*  
*having info freely available via the main SLANZA website*

Comments in support of making the wiki public (to view, at least):

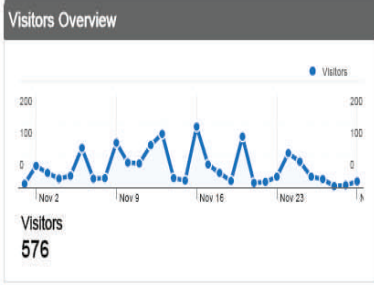
*library staff who cannot afford SLANZA membership fees won't miss out (particularly staff in sole charge, on few hours, who need lots of support)*  
*having a public site enables potential new members to evaluate its usefulness first*  
*people outside the sector can keep up to date with school library issue*  
*seeing what SLANZA does may encourage new members to join and be part of the SLANZA community*  
*freely sharing information and ideas is an important way that we are able to support each-other, and continuously improve what we do in school libraries*  
*we should keep adding information and see what direction the wiki goes in before 'reigning it in'*

There are currently about 200 SLANZA members who are not on the wiki. Those that would like to join can contact Carole Gardiner [caroleg@queens.school.nz](mailto:caroleg@queens.school.nz) to join. Carole has been a gem, and has worked really hard to help lots of people get on the wiki when they were having difficulties.

The wiki is a labour of love, and all of us on the moderating team have been happy to get it up and running, but it is up to you, the SLANZA members to make it valuable, usable and helpful. Please post on the threads, new writers have been appointed and the number of those is growing all the time. We'd like it to be an example of the excellent work going on in school libraries across New Zealand, we know that many of you have valuable ideas and thoughts to share. We look forward to seeing this tool grow and move forward as SLANZA grows.

Finally, a thanks to everyone who wrote such encouraging comments in the feedback on the questionnaire. Already some of your suggestions have been implemented.

**PRESIDENT'S REPORT TO THE ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING OF THE  
SCHOOL LIBRARY ASSOCIATION OF NEW ZEALAND AOTEAROA,  
CHRISTCHURCH, 2009**

A very warm welcome again to you all to this the ninth Annual General Meeting of SLANZA and thank you for your attendance. In this report I will outline the undertakings that have been made this year and the significant challenges that have been faced in these last 12 months as we have endeavoured to carry out our organisation's aims of strengthening and promoting the role of school libraries and school library staff in New Zealand schools.



Before I begin though I would like to sincerely thank all those who have been involved in this Conference. What a wonderful opportunity it is for learning and for meeting with our colleagues. Thank you to the Conference Committee, the Conference Organiser, the Keynote Speakers, Workshop Presenters and all the helpers behind the scenes for your work, without which such an event would not be possible. Thank you too to our sponsors and I would ask you all for your ongoing support of them.

The 2008-2009 year has certainly presented some challenges for us. First we learned at the end of last year that the Ministry of Education was not to continue funding of the Schools' Cataloguing Information Service (SCIS) for New Zealand schools. Whilst the original agreement with Curriculum Corporation was only for the 2006 and 2007 calendar years with a right of renewal for one further year – which did happen – we were extremely disappointed that this funding was not continued further. SCIS had made a huge improvement to the standard of cataloguing in NZ schools with an opportunity for accuracy and consistency in catalogue records. Despite our best efforts at lobbying the Minister of Education, the Associate Ministers of Education, the NZ Labour Party Spokesperson for Education and the Deputy Secretary Schooling at the Ministry of Education, the funding was discontinued. We are grateful however that the National Library, with some funding from the Ministry of Education, undertook to develop 'SchoolsCat' as an alternative for those schools that could not/would not meet the cost of subscribing to SCIS.

The announcement of changes to the design and delivery of their services to schools by National Library has also been a big concern to us. In particular, the lack of true consultation and the reduction in the number of School Library Adviser positions throughout the country and the proposed changes in the delivery of professional development to school library staff. The loss of face-to-face contact, particularly for those in isolated, and or sole charge positions, will be a huge loss and the success of online delivery of professional development is doubtful, particularly for those in areas without high speed broadband coverage. National Executive has written to, and now that the final structure is known, is presenting a submission to Services to Young New Zealanders expressing our concerns about these developments. But, we are also seeking ways in which we may collaborate with SYN-Z'ers to support school library staff and so lessen the impact of these changes.

A real concern we have currently is the status of our sponsorship from Corporate Express, the company which bought out Raeco. Despite making applications in a manner agreed to with Corporate Express last year we have to date not received sponsorship applied for on behalf of our regions. Similarly, I understand that the Conference Committee was unable to secure their sponsorship. This will now necessitate a great deal of work by National Executive to locate alternative sources of funding for SLANZA in these difficult economic times.

Now for good news. Our regions are in good heart, with membership growing and some very valuable professional development being offered to members. Later in this meeting we are to consider the establishment of an eighth SLANZA region with the separation of the Otago and Southland Regions as it is felt to be the best way to maintain and develop these diverse areas. I would like to thank the regional committee members for all the hard work you do to strengthen and promote the school libraries in your regions.

Now for good news.

Our regions are in good heart, with membership growing and some very valuable professional development being offered to members. A wiki for SLANZA members to enhance communication and share information has been launched this year as well. We will have a discussion about this shortly too.

It is very pleasing to see that 130 applications from school library staff had been approved for Professional Registration as at the end of August 2009.

In order to maintain our efforts to strengthen school libraries SLANZA has this year maintained representation on the following bodies:

The New Zealand Libraries Strategic Advisory Forum; the EPIC Governance Group; the AnyQuestions Service Overview Group; the LIANZA Professional Registration Scheme; the 2009 LIANZA Remuneration Survey Committee; the Marketing the Profession Working Group; the Te Puna Strategic Advisory Committee; the Multiple Literacies Working Group; the Open Polytechnic Information and Library Studies Committee and the PPTA ICT Taskforce. These commitments are becoming a real concern for the National Executive because of the amount of time that is required on top of peoples' day jobs and with time needed to be spent out of school for some of the National Executive. Ways to share this load more equitably are to be considered.

A significant development leading out of one of these groups though is that as a result of our presentation of issues of real concern regarding NZ school libraries to the NZ Libraries Strategic Advisory Forum, a 'Discussion Document' is being developed by the Policy and Communications Department of the National Library. This document will be taken by National Library to the Ministry of Education for discussion later this year. Much is hoped for from this development and we are grateful to National Library for this, because I am convinced that it will not be until the Ministry of Education recognizes the vital importance of school libraries and school library staff, that progress can be made to solve the very serious issues concerning our members. To date, SLANZA has found it incredibly difficult to gain traction with the Ministry of Education. This year we have written to them regarding, among other things, a mandate and required standards for school libraries and the response was to quote, "school boards will decide, in consultation with their communities, whether to have a school library and to what standard that library is resourced". This is just not good enough. SLANZA has also requested a meeting with the Minister of Education and this has been promised for "later in the year". We are not holding our breath!

The forthcoming "New Curriculum" provides school library staff with new opportunities to influence student achievement and the Government's current focus on literacy also provides school library staff with new opportunities for service design and delivery. It is very important however that our connection to student achievement is clearly shown. Evidence based practice must be implemented if we are to show our worth.

Before I close I would like to sincerely thank Johann Williams in her role as Immediate-Past President for her support to me during these last two years in my role as President. Her very considered and wise opinions have indeed been a huge help to me. I would also like to welcome Senga White into her position as incoming President and wish her well for these next 2 years. From it's beginnings just over nine years ago I do believe that SLANZA has indeed grown to be "a national voice to increase the profile of people who make a significant but sometimes unrecognised contribution to the learning environments of our school students" (Judi Hancock, 2003), but, there is still much work to be done.

We now understand that despite mail outs, and trying to spread the word of SLANZA that many primary school library staff in Otago don't know about SLANZA and the opportunities it provides for members. We were really lucky that conference was in Christchurch this year and our region was well represented there, last week at our most recent meeting a number of us gave a summary of some of the workshops we went to. In other news, our Otago Region wiki is up and running and it is being used. 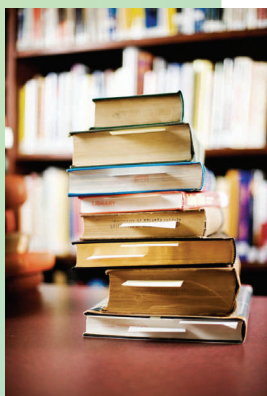

# 2009 Remuneration Survey Released



*The remuneration gap between people working in school libraries and other library sectors continues to grow*

The LIANZA Remuneration Survey Committee was delighted to release the results of the 2009 remuneration survey on the 4<sup>th</sup> December 2009.

The key findings are:

Data was collected for 4,147 people who work in libraries - an increase of 11% over the 2008 survey

321 libraries made returns – compared to 269 in 2008

Remuneration has increased in most roles and in most sectors (by 3-4%)

Remuneration increases were small for library managers (roles R and S)

There were decreases in average remuneration for library managers in some sectors (polytechnics, special libraries, and public libraries)

The remuneration gap between people working in school libraries and other library sectors continues to grow

LIANZA undertakes this survey to gather information about what people working in libraries are paid across the various library sectors. The stated aim of the LIANZA remuneration survey is to provide data which will:

- Allow us to compare salaries and conditions across New Zealand
- Compare the trends from the previous surveys in 2005, 2007, and 2008;

Contribute to ensuring that the salary decisions our employers make for us and our staff are fair and justified.

Now that LIANZA has conducted this remuneration survey 4 times, the trends and patterns in the data over the 5 years is proving very useful.

LIANZA would like to thank the New Zealand Law Librarians Association (NZLLA), Council of New Zealand University Librarians (CONZUL), the National Library, the School Library Association of New Zealand (SLANZA), the Institutes of Technology & Polytechnics New Zealand (ITPNZ), Special Libraries & Information Services (SLIS) and the Association of Public Library Managers (APLM) for supporting the survey and all the Library Managers who contributed data on remuneration and benefits. Without your support the Remuneration Survey would not be possible.
