About the course

SLANZA's *Connected Librarians* course is a facilitated online 'study group'-style of professional development.

The individual modules that made up the course deliver professional learning in several key areas of school librarianship, and additionally are designed to provide a basic grounding in a cross-section of online tools.

Each module takes two weeks to complete, with a minimum time commitment of 3 hours per week. You can work at your own pace at any time; we recommend that if possible you complete the set tasks each week to stay in sync with other learners. Course facilitators will be online each day and available via email to provide support.
