From the President

Most regions have recently had their AGM's and so I would like to welcome those who have remained on a committee and those who have joined a regional committee for the first time. I am sure you will find it a most rewarding and interesting experience. For those who have stood down from a committee this year, thank you for your hard work and dedication. It was with sadness that we learned last month of the folding, for the time being, of the Top of the South (TOTS) sub-branch of the Aoraki Region owing to a drop in membership and to the changing circumstan-

ces of several of the committee with no one else able to take up the role. Thank you TOTS – we remember well the wonderful Mini-Conference you organised in Nelson in July, 2006.

Benjamin Franklin once said "but in this world nothing can be said to be certain, except death and taxes". I would like to add 'change' to this list. The recently announced changes in service design and delivery by

NLNZ School Services are currently a cause of great concern among some members. As this was only an internal review and SLANZA members were therefore unable to comment, it is felt that there was no real opportunity for input by school library staff, as significant stakeholders, into the development of the new structure. As advocates for good school library services, we are concerned that the changes and innovations in the delivery of frontline services to schools will, in fact, meet the needs of those school libraries and school library staff most in need of support to enable them to support the teaching and learning in their schools. These concerns have been conveyed to NLNZ by National Executive. It is sincerely hoped that they achieve "the systemic and structural shifts and developments that school libraries really need if they are to survive in the future" (p8 Structural Change Proposal). The proof will be in the pudding.

It is with great anticipation that we await our 2009 Conference - "Turning Heads" at Rangi Ruru Girls' School in Christchurch, 28-30 September. The Conference Committee has been working extremely hard organising what will be a lively and informative Conference with great Professional Development and opportunities for networking with our colleagues. The Hon Anne Tolley, Minister of Education, is also to speak. Remember - Early Bird registrations close on 1 August. Ahh, Christchurch in the springtime!

Included in this Newsletter for your information is the 2009 Work Plan to which the National Executive is working. This is instead of a longer term strategic plan as we have had in the past. The National Executive has nominated a project owner for each task; this owner is responsible for seeing that piece of work through to completion. We recognise that the National Executive members fulfill their SLANZA responsibilities over and above their day jobs and so, to achieve our goals we may need to enlist the support and expertise of SLANZA members to contribute to working groups as necessary.



Book Review

The loblolly boy by James Norcliffe. Longacre Press, Dunedin. 2009. ISBN 978 1 877460 25 8. pbk. RRP: \$19.99

A loblolly boy is an unworldly being with the ability to fly. He is invisible to all except extra 'sensitive' people, the dangerous 'collectors' and Captain Bass, an ageless ex-mariner who lives in an isolated small beach hut. A loblolly boy can switch bodies with a 'sensitive' who longs to escape their unbearable life. Red is a young lad living in a home for abandoned children. The uncaring staff and cruelty of other children make his life a misery. When Red meets a strange boy in the wooded garden who promises escape he grasps at this chance and too late realises that he has exchanged bodies with the strange winged boy. The joy of being able to fly and soar away from his misery takes Red to Captain Bass where he has a glimpse of his future through the captain's magic telescope. He realises that the life of a loblolly boy is a very lonely one and the only way to escape is to find another 'sensitive' to exchange with to enable him to become human again. His quest is full of adventure, humour and danger, and has a satisfying ending. This fantasy novel will be relished by boys and girls of year 8 to 10 level and is highly recommended for the school library.







News from the National Executive Meeting, Wgtn 20/21 June 2009

NLNZ Services to Young New Zealanders -

Geraldine Howell gave a presentation about proposed changes to School Services.

She began by outlining the process that is being undertaken. Staff consultation period ends 26 June. Feedback will then be considered and final decisions will be announced to staff on 13 July. The implementation of the new structure will begin depending on the final decisions.

At this stage it is only an internal consultation document. Opportunity for feedback from SLANZA was discussed but only after final decisions have been announced but before implementation of new structure. SLANZA NE will then make a formal response.

Geraldine then gave a brief outline of the proposed structure.

Of note:

- 3 CIS Centres
- Fewer Advisors but addition of 2 Maori and 1 Pacifika Advisors
- 0800 Advisors telephone number
- Enhanced web presence
- 8 new Specialist positions
- 4 technology projects
- Involvement with strategic development of school libraries through the Strategic Advisory Forum. (see below).
- SLANZA invited to have input into Professional Development content and service delivery.

Strategic Advisory Forum-

SLANZA is represented on this Forum. Because of concerns expressed at Forum meetings and evidence from previous LIANZA Remuneration Surveys, a preliminary paper 'School Libraries: Problem Definition Paper – May 2009' has been produced by NLNZ Strategy, Policy and Communications Team. This is being developed into a Discussion Paper for future consultation by NLNZ, LIANZA and SLANZA with the Ministry of Education and ERO. It is hoped that this will provide SLANZA engagement with the Ministry of Education which has proven difficult to instigate so far.

"Turning Heads" SLANZA Conference 2009 – 28-30 September at Rangi Ruru Girls' School Christchurch -

Keynote speakers now confirmed. 3 major sponsors – AccessIt, All Books New Zealand and Wheelers Books. Minister of Education, Anne Tolley, to speak. Will include AGM.

Handbook for NE members - has been developed and to be placed on SLANZA website.

Otago and Southland Regions Trial – has been successful and so will be formalised at AGM.

SLANZA Wiki – is being developed. To be linked to SLANZA website.

Pay and Employment Equity – concern about closure of the Pay and Employment Equity Unit to be conveyed to Minister of State Services.

2009 Work Plan - additions and amendments made. To be posted on SLANZA website.

SLANZA 10th Anniversary 2010 – ideas for celebration discussed.

AnyQuestions Service Overview Group Representative – Kim Slack (Aoraki) to be SLANZA representative.

Te Puna Strategic Advisory Committee – expressions of interest from Wellington Region members to be called for because of proximity.

Johnann Williams and Heather Manning (LIANZA rep.) - farewelled from last National Executive meeting and thanked for invaluable service and dedication.
